## PHE National General Practice Profiles Update

On 3<sup>rd</sup> December, Public Health England (PHE) published an update to the National General Practice Profiles which draw together a wide range of information to give an overview of the health needs and priorities for each GP practice in England.

The profiles have been refreshed with 2012-13 data for:

- Quality and Outcomes Framework 2012/13
- Attribution Dataset populations from April 2013
- New children's hospital admission data
- GP Patient Survey 2012/13 results

Trend charts have also been introduced allowing practices to view the change in indicator values over time.

### What does this mean for Richmond?

- Richmond GP Practices can view their data and compare against CCG and national benchmarks and other practices in the same CCG, deprivation decile or peer group<sup>1</sup>
- Richmond CCG and LB Richmond can obtain an overview of Richmond general practices by viewing the CCG indicator averages with the England averages

For the recently updated indicators, Richmond is in the best quartile in England for several:

- Lower than average proportion of people had a:
  - Longstanding health condition (unspecified)<sup>2</sup>
  - Health-related problem (mobility, self-care, usual activities, pain/discomfort, anxiety/depression) in daily life<sup>2</sup>
  - Long-term back problem<sup>2</sup>
  - Arthritis or long-term joint problem<sup>2</sup>
- Higher than average proportion in paid work or full-time education<sup>2</sup>
- Lower than average prevalence of coronary heart disease, heart failure, heart failure with left ventricular dysfunction, stroke, hypertension, obesity, diabetes, depression, asthma and chronic kidney disease<sup>3</sup>
- Lower than average smoking prevalence<sup>2</sup>
- Lower than average 0-17 year-old emergency admissions for lower respiratory tract infections, gastroenteritis and asthma/diabetes/epilepsy<sup>5</sup>
- Lower than average 0-17 year-old admissions due to injury<sup>5</sup>

...and the worst quartile in England for two:

- Lower than average proportion of patient's with certain conditions<sup>4</sup> had their smoking status recorded in their notes in the last 15 months<sup>3</sup>
- Lower than average proportion who know how to contact an out-of-hours service<sup>2</sup>

<sup>1</sup> A peer group is a collection of similar practices in England, based on age structure, ethnic composition, deprivation level and rurality.
